Some items from the latest newsletter of the Plymouth Diocese Synod coordinators:

What next in our Diocese? The synodal journey continues in our Diocese with the materials we sent out with our diocesan synthesis and the questions raised by Bishop Mark which can be found on our website: <https://www.plymouth-diocese.org.uk/key-documents/parish-resources/>

Cardinal Nichols reflected that accompaniment is a challenge for every parish He invites us to consider w ho are those who feel that they do not belong, or fear they may not be made welcome?

"It is a challenge for every organisation to look at itself and ask how easy is it for those who are different to join in our activities It is a question for each one of us do we try to be close to those we meet regularly, with whom we might work or live, simply making it clear that no matter what happens we will not turn away, not in judgement, nor in disdain, nor in fear?"

Let's continue to listen to the Holy Spirit and to each other as we reflect on how we accompany each other in the coming months and years. We will be sending out further resources later this year.

In his homily on 29th June, (at the Mass at which our former Bishop received the Pallium as Metropolitan Archbishop of Cardiff), Pope Francis reflected on the synodal journey:

"The Synod that we are now celebrating calls us to become a Church that gets up, one that is not turned in on itself, but capable of pressing forward, leaving behind its own prisons and setting out to meet the world, with the courage to open doors."

The English Benedictine Congregation is the oldest of the twenty Benedictine Congregations in the world. It traces its origins to the Fourth Lateran Council in 1215 A.D. Under Henry VIII, the Congregation nearly came to extinction. Queen Mary Tudor restored the ancient abbey of Westminster, but this revival ceased on the accession of Elizabeth I. By 1607, only one monk of the pre-Reformation Congregation survived: Dom Sigebert Buckley. On 21st November 1607, he aggregated two young English monks of the Cassinese Congregation to his own congregation, thus ensuring a certain continuity of the congregation. The English Benedictine story stretches all the way back to St. Augustine of Canterbury, the Benedictine monk sent by Pope Gregory the Great to evangelise the Angles.

The two monks joined other English monks exiled in France who were training for work on the English mission. For the next two hundred years, many monks worked secretly in England, serving recusant Catholics as priests. Several were martyred and three, Ambrose Barlow, John Roberts and Alban Roe, were canonized by Pope Paul VI in 1970. In the nineteenth century monasteries were once again established in England.

At present, the English Benedictine Congregation consists of ten abbeys of monks and two abbeys of nuns. Three of the abbeys of men are located in the United States. There are also priories in Peru and Zimbabwe.

The General Chapter is a meeting which takes place normally every four years (this year's is five years after the last one, since 2021's was postponed because of covid.). Benedictine monasteries enjoy substantial independence; each community is free to discern the will of the Holy Spirit about the details of their monastic life and the ways in which they are called by God to spread the Good News; the role of the General Chapter is to discuss matters of common interest, to be an organ of mutual support for the monasteries and to decide on the Constitutions which set standards of best practice and apply the precepts of the Rule of St. Benedict to the current time and culture.

On Monday, the Abbots and Abbesses of all the monasteries, together with a delegate elected by each community and the officials of the congregation, will assemble at Buckfast. The first item of business will be to consider the application of three monasteries of nuns which wish to join the congregation. The Abbesses and delegates from Kylemore Abbey in Connemara, Ireland, Jamberoo Abbey in New South Wales, Australia and MariaVall Abbey near Malmö in Sweden will be hoping to be welcomed into the Chapter and the signs are positive.
