# OUR LADY'S MARNHULL AND ST BENEDICT'S GILLINGHAM

I'm most grateful to those parishioners who joined the children and staff of our parish school for the May Procession last Thursday. It shows the children that we are interested in their spiritual welfare and, for some of them, is one of the rare experiences they have of adults other than their teachers who believe in God and put their faith into action.

We began in the school hall, welcomed by Mrs. Betts as Headteacher. I reminded the children of why we love Our Blessed Lady – example of trusting faith in God; of courageous and eager cooperation with God's plan; of devoted motherhood to our blessed Lord; of steadfast love, accompanying him even as he faced his final agony. For all these reasons, Jesus knew Mary would be a wonderful mother to the whole human race, so he gave her to the Apostle John who stood at the foot of the Cross, to be his mother and, by extension, to offer her motherly support and protection to all the disciples of Jesus.

I recalled the lovely hymn which was sung at the May Processions in his own Primary School, but which we don't hear so often these days (Mrs. Betts said she herself hadn't heard it since she was at Primary School!) So, our brave band of parishioners sang it for the children as a very fitting start to our procession:

*Bring flowers of the rarest,  
Bring blossoms the fairest,  
from garden and woodland  
and hillside and dale;  
our full hearts are swelling,  
our glad voices telling  
the praise of the loveliest  
flower of the vale.*

with blossoms today.

And so, we set off on our little journey together around the school field, pausing at some beautiful 'stations' on the way, which illustrated the Glorious Mysteries of the Rosary – the Resurrection, the Ascension, Pentecost, the Assumption and the Coronation of our Lady. At successive stations, Grace, Ellie, Madalena and Sophie told us something about those glorious mysteries of our faith and then the children sang, very beautifully and off by heart, the Hail Mary. And so we reached the statue of Our Lady outside the school, and all the children placed flowers they had brought from home around it while Tiah crowned it with flowers. Arlo and Jess said some prayers and I gave a blessing, remembering the people of Ukraine and praying for peace as the city which bears Our Lady's name, Mariupol, falls to the invaders.

God blessed us with a beautiful day for this pure, heartwarming act of devotion which we completed by singing "As I kneel before you...all I have, I give to you..."

Mother of mine, present them to my Lord.
