Synodal Update for the Diocese of Plymouth

Welcome to the fifth of our Walking Together Updates

It has been great to see so many people participating in this journey of discernment and reflection. We have already received over 700 different contributions during the listening phase. What are the emerging themes?

A whole host of issues have been discussed – people's views on the structures of the Church, how we walk together as a People of God; how we encounter others and reach out; how we communicate; how we practice our faith; the role of Priests and Laity; the importance of the youth; inclusion and diversity; tradition and modernity; gender issues; LGBTQ+; safeguarding and abuse; leadership and Mission. The listening journey has highlighted many different points of view on all these issues but there has been an almost universal welcome for the process of Synodality and a hope that we can continue to walk together, listening to each other and the Holy Spirit and engaging in dialogue to strengthen the Mission of the Church.

The Pre-Syndodal Events

We organised two pre-synodal events – one in Poole and one in Plymouth – to enable as many people as possible to attend. We are particularly grateful to those who made long journeys in order to participate. Bishop Mark attended both events, along with members of the Synodal working group, to hear first-hand from over 100 people about our Synodal journey so far and what we can learn both about the process and also about the key themes and issues that have arisen.

In his reflection, Bishop Mark said 'At the heart of what we are doing today is about a miraculous catch of fish — that's why we are here — it's what being a Christian is all about. There is in some sense the truth that we have each been caught by the Lord. We have been brought into His net — the life of the Church, in which we receive His life, and we want to help to bring others into this reality too. That is what is at the heart of being a Synodal Church. Fishing — the Mission — is at the heart of what we are doing.

We are on the road together, but we are not heading nowhere. All of us are creatures of God, made in his image and likeness, and that is true of every human person. That's one of the reasons why listening is at the heart of this Synodal process — a very deep and profound listening which is as extensive as possible. All those meetings, all those written submissions — what is at the heart of that is patient and attentive listening, which of course must go on. And the reason that we want to listen is because we see in all people the likeness of the Creator.' (The full recording can be heard here)

We are still reviewing the feedback from the two events as well as all the other information shared with us throughout this listening journey to enable the working group to discern what is submitted to the next phase of listening at the level of the Bishops' Conference. Members of the working group, along with Bishop Mark have also been invited to a national meeting in early June to contribute to the national synthesis, so plenty of opportunity to ensure that our listening journey is part of that final document submitted by the Church in England and Wales

What will happen next?

The Diocesan working group will be meeting at the end of March/early April to finalise our Diocesan synthesis for submission to Bishop Mark. The working group consists of 10 people, clergy and lay, men and women. The aim of this diverse group will be to fairly reflect everything that has been shared with us. Some people expressed concern that the synthesis would be 'censored' to exclude more sensitive or critical comments. The structure of the final synthesis will include both the joys and the pains expressed during the process to mirror the breadth of views shared during this journey. Bishop Mark will also contribute his reflections.

This isn't the end of the process and people will be invited to reflect on the Diocesan synthesis and consider what it means for their local context and how we can continue the journey together. There will be more information in our next newsletter about next steps at Diocesan level. We know that many parishes are already taking forward new initiatives – do share your plans and ideas as we would love to hear them.
